Sessions' Objectives:

By the end of these sessions, the students will be able to;

- Delineate the meaning and concepts of constitution
- State the functions of constitution in general and in promoting development and gender equality in particular
- Analyze the constitution making principles and processes
- Identify the constitutional complements and human rights convention of relevance to achieve sustained development

Session (17): Concepts and Functions of Constitutions: (2hrs)

The sessions will cover the meaning of constitution, the main components of constitution, constitutional analysis process, and why the constitution is important to ordinary people. Also, a presentation on the issues of constitution superiority, separation of Power, Rule of Law, Judiciary independency, Equality and justice will take place.
